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

For a rising time

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


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## Songs Of Love Stephen A. Love - Always Within Kissin' Range

CMG WORLDWIDE artistStephen A. Love may not be a household name among rock music fans, but his long and varied musical journey reads like a Rolling Stone "Who's Who" of the 1970's and 80's California music scene. It was none other than Randy Meisner, pre- Eagles, who led Love to California to pursue a career as a professional musician, and when Meisner left Rick Nelson's Stone Canyon Band to join Don Hendley and Glenn Frey backing Linda Ronstadt, it was a 20-year-old Stephen A. Love, playing bass and singing harmony in Nelson's band. Love was in the band for the infamous "Garden Party" incident and can be seen playing bass on the video of the chart-topping song that resulted from it. At Glen Campbell's suggestion, Love's song Let It Bring You Along was the opening cut on the album.

Love went on to join former Byrd Roger McQuinn's backing band and contributed his song Somebody Loves You to the 1975 album Roger McQuinn and Band. Again, it was chosen as the opening cut.

In 1976, Stephen A. Love moved on to join Country Rock pioneers, the New Riders of the Purple Sage during the height of their

popularity in the later 1970's. Love sang lead and harmony while contributing a rocking bass guitar, playing to large audiences around the country, including the legendary Englishtown, NJ show when the New Riders joined the Grateful Dead and Marshall Tucker Band before 125,000 fans. Two New Riders' albums, Who Are These Guys and Marin County Line, feature Love's compositions and lead vocals.

Moving on to John Cipollina's San Fransisco All-Stars, eventually Mr .Love became a senior project manager and his musical career took a back seat, but occasional tours of Europe and releases on the International charts kept him involved and pursuing his passion. Upon retirement from the construction field, music has once again moved to the forefront of his life, and Stephen has been active, not only performing and recording, but in management and mentoring upcoming musicians. He draws on his vast wealth of experience and talent to help others climbing the ladder. In 2011 and 2012. Stephen released 3 "Number One" singles in 13 European countries. revitalizing his musical career, and in May of 2018 Stephen A. Love presented us with a full-length CD, Always Within Kissing Range

of You. Four of the ten songs on the CD have charted "Number One" on entertainment industries Radio Submit, sister to the Roots Charts.


Don't look for the Country Rock/ Rockabilly sound that characterized Love's career as performing band member. Always Within Kissing Range is primarily a blues album, with Jazz and Pop influences. It features Love on piano and various guitars, playing lead, slide, rhythm, and bass. He throws in some harmonica work to boot. The harp is primitive, yet sufficient, while the rest of his playing is top shelf. Always blessed with excellent range and exquisite command of his vocals, the years have not robbed those qualities from Love's voice. His singing is spot on through the album.

A growling, self-penned number, Number One Son of a Gun, gets things started, and Love airs the song out. The title track, Always Within Kissing Range of You, with its Jazz feelings, comes next. It's warm and gentle. Timing and textures are everything, and Love

has a deep well to draw from. The soulful Can't Love Someone Who Doesn't Love Me follows and has a familiar feeling to it. Again, Love gives his vocals a serious workout.

Walkin' After Midnight was Patsy Cline's first big hit, back in 1957. Stephen A. Love gives it a fresh and enjoyable rendering, before getting down smooth and dirty on That's Why They Call Me Mr. Love. Straight ahead blues comes down at us in So Long Bannytyne. A delightful cover of Leon Russell's Lady Blue is easy to listen to, and is followed by a heart-felt performance of Rod Stewart's People Get Ready. A wild accusing Wasting Mv Time concludes the recording.

Always Within Kissing Range provides good company for driving around on backroads. It's doing well on Independent charts, and well worth the effort of finding for the roots rock fan. ## **CD** Review

## Garry Cogdell & Chaz DePaulo: Acoustic Blues Live at St. Georges Country Store 2018 Smoke Tone Records

One a gentle summer evening in 2017, a group of musical friends assembled at the St. Georges Country Store along the banks of the Delaware and Chesapeake Canal. Joining local blues legend Garry Cogdell, after flying in from Colorado, were Blues Hall of Fame (NY Chapter) member Chaz DePaolo, and harmonica ace David Biondo. Johnny Christopher manned the bass, and John Digiovanni (Steal Your Peach, Stackabones) handled percussion.

The beer was cold, the gumbo hot and spicy, and the music flowed sweetly. The result is this just released CD from Smoke Tone Records, Live at St.GEORGES COUNTRY STORE, a collection of mostly originals, with a couple of Elmore James' covers tossed in for good measure.

Garry Cogdell is known as a master of the Delta and Hill Country Blues vernaculars, while Chaz DePaulo has made his mark primarily on electric guitar with his innovative rock oriented fusion blues. Both are prolific song writers and recording artists, with numerous CDs to their respective credits.

David Biondo's extensive career on harmonica goes back many years and includes playing with many local, regional, and national acts in both the blues and country rock gendres. A comprehensive list of musicians he's recorded or shared the stage with would be as long as your arm.

The synergistic result of their "one night stand" is a delicious down home feast of acoustic blues, worth listening to over and over again. The timing is tight, and the spontaneous arrangements textured without over-embellishment. It's three craftsmen sharing their talents gracefully, to make each other's songs sound their best.


I won't pick apart the individual songs in this review; you can do that just fine yourself. There's a variety of styles and tempos to keep the listener attentive and entertained. Both artists write in similar yet

diverse modes. A couple of the highlights are DePaulo's Angel On My Shoulder and the final number, Cogdell's take on Elmore James' It Hurts Me Too. If I could offer one complaint, it's that the recording didn't take full advantage of DePaolo's distinctive biting acoustic leads; it seems as if he was holding back, perhaps not wanting to dominate the ensemble.

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

## **Dungeons and Dragons 5th Edition: A Critical Hit**

In 2017, Dungeons & Dragons (D&D) had its best sales year since Wizards of the Coast took it over from TSR in 1997. Interactive storytelling is still at the core of the game, with the books, lore, rules, accessories, and of course the players, all contributing to that end. For those of you less familiar with role playing games (RPGs), the idea is to participate in adventures, gain experience, find treasure, and level-up. The games are generally more open-ended than typical board games, with a lot of improvisation and spontaneity involved. Like any good improv, the key is in the preparation, knowing your character especially, and getting inside their head. Also reacting to players and events is important, with the "yes-and" improv philosophy holding true.

The core level-up system was put into the first edition of D&D in 1974 by its creator, Gary Gygax (true followers harken back to the earlier Chainmail, and older still, basic wargaming). A version of this level-up progression system is now at the core of virtually every video game with a leveling up scheme (Call of Duty, Overwatch, World of Warcraft, and Fortnite, to name just a few). While video games have reached mass audiences, the D&D tabletop system has, up to the 5th edition, been considered by many to be for wonky rule nerds, making it less accessible to the masses. There was even a brief period in the 1980s where D&D was falsely connected to the occult. After opening with a well received 3rd edition shortly following their acquisition of TSR, Wizards of the Coast missed the boat with their 4th edition (badly by most accounts). So bad was this effort that another company, Paizo, came out with an evolution of the D&D 3.5 edition called Pathfinder to carry the torch. In fact, these two systems are still both very popular and available today. Fortunately, after the disaster that was the 4th edition, Wizards listened to the fans, and came out with a very elegant and well designed 5th edition, following in the spirit of the first three editions. Often referred to simply as "5e," the current iteration is very user friendly, and offers the same expanded D&D universe in a relatively easy to use package. It is much more friendly for new players, and you don't need a PhD in D&D to play.

Like many others my age, I was a D&D 2nd edition guy, and have a fairly substantial collection of books and modules. I also played other RPGs (Star Frontiers, Gamma World, Star Wars, and Indiana Jones to name a few). For a time as a teenager I played a lot, both as Dungeon Master (or DM for short), and as a player. After a long hiatus (some 20 years), last summer one of my English Education students developed a series of les-

sons for teachers on how to integrate D&D into an English writing curriculum. His task was to make D&D easy to understand, and when he delivered his workshop, it was one of the most highly attended workshops any of my students has ever delivered. That same student took me and some other students through a short home-brew adventure as part of another class, and after that I purchased the Player's Handbook, a Dungeon Master's Screen, and the 5e Starter Set.

After dabbling a bit more on my own, one of my work colleagues caught wind that I played, and invited me into a group. Basically, when you are invited to one of these groups. it is like a job interview. There is a compatibility check that happens among the players (no D20 role necessary), to see if people are enjoying themselves and have good chemistry. Fortunately things worked out, and we now have a flexible group of 5-8 players at any given time, playing once every 1-2 weeks. The typical session is 3 hours, although from time to time we will run longer. Like many groups, we have multiple campaigns going at any given time. And while gameplay tends to happen in slow motion, that allows for a whole lot of embellishment of what happens while you play. The DM writes a summary of the session, so there is an ongoing record of what happened. This allows players who don't play every week to catch up and jump right in when they can play.

We currently have one high level adventure running, and another low level adventure

running in parallel. The work of the Dungeon Master in preparing for the sessions is significant, so we share that responsibility (I run one campaign, and another person runs the other). We equate it to a TV show, where there is the core cast, and some regular guest star appearances. In terms of mechanics, we use the website D&D Beyond for our characters and materials (the website is superior to the app for now), although there is some pen and paper action as well. Others use roll20.net, or the STEAM game Tabletop (and there are plenty of other helper apps). We even built a gaming table that has a LED TV underneath it to project dynamic maps. We then added in some 3D prints and miniatures to help round out the physical objects to interact with, and altogether it makes for quite a fun gaming experience.

And D&D has crept into general pop culture as well (not just in The Big Bang Theory). Perhaps the most widely known is Stranger Things, where the entire show is basically one big D&D adventure. Other notables include Critical Role, which is super popular on Twitch, and involves a group of professional voice actors acting out their games, most notably the fantastic DM, Matt Mercer. Finally, I can't end without mentioning Vin Diesel and his over-the-top witch hunter character, perhaps the most well known celebrity D&D Player. Overall, this Dungeon Master gives D&D 5th Edition a 20 out of 20, a critical hit in my book



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# Movie Review



# Won't You Be My Neighbor was a clear case of substance over style. The tackled, uniquely with puppet skits and in-

In the slough of summer blockbuster superhero movies, sequels, franchises, and animated films, what a refreshing treat "Won't You Be My

Neighbor" is. It would be refreshing, even if it wasn't the needle in the haystack of big, bombastic, boisterous-well you get the picture. Its power is in its simplicity and this simplicity comes from its subject matter, Fred Rogers.

Often parodied, spoofed and derided, Mister Rogers' Neighborhood was a staple of children's programming for decades. Who could imagine that a show with such basic production values- the sets and puppets look like they were made five minutes before going to air,-would reach anyone? It was a clear case of substance over style. The Substance being self-acceptance, tolerance, recognizing real feelings, and most importantly love and connection.

Mr. Rogers' empathy is eerily powerful and it takes on a truly magical quality when it inhabits a sock puppet named Daniel the Tiger. Some of the most moving clips involve Daniel the Tiger chatting with a wide-eyed open faced child whose expression truly embodies the adage: a picture is worth a thousand words.

Personally, I don't remember watching Mr. Rogers as a child. Perhaps growing up in a rural area, my television channel selection was limited. I vaguely remember seeing it as an older child, and not really getting it. Mr. Rogers' audience typically skews seven years old or younger. Given this, I was amazed at some of the topics that were teractions of characters on the show. The fear that media coverage of the Vietnam War brought to children was addressed, as well as the general upheaval of American society in the late 1960's and early 1970's. The skit involving the king building a wall is especially prophetic today.

The documentary film market has opened up with the world of streaming, especially Netflix. This is ultimately a good thing; however, a problem with more documentaries getting made and often quickly is lack of factual research and also lack of focus. Often documentaries feel like a presentation of facts and scenes and emotional moments,

but without a general thesis. Luckily, Won't You be My Neighbor is directed by Oscar winning director Morgan Neville who is deft at both emotional involvement and thematic cohesion. It's this combination of "I didn't know that" and "I suddenly feel like crying" is what makes the film both illuminating and powerful. Yet there are no special tricks used to pull this off. The story telling is traditional; on screen interviews with family members, co-workers and media specialists intercut with clips of the show and other archival footage. Perhaps this could be part of Neville's plan, that sometimes the simplest things are the most profound, especially if they are truthful.

## 26th Chenango Blues Fest

Elvin Bishop is a rock-n-roll Hall of Famer, and Samantha Fish just won the Blues Music Award as Female Artist of the Year. It's a one two punch of a legend and the best up and coming artist around at the top of the bill at this years 26th Chenango Blues Fest. It's going to be a knock out lineup from start to finish as the Festival enters its second twenty five years swinging.

The unofficial kickoff will come at the NBT Bank Free Thursday show in East Side Park on August 16th with a special show featuring Jersey Shore legends Southside Johnny and the Asbury Jukes. Over a forty year career performing and recording with the likes of Bruce Springsteen, Jon Bon Jovi and Steve Van Zandt, Southside Johnny has earned a reputation as a consummate showman and band leader.

Friday's free admission show at the County Fairgrounds is sponsored by New York Central Mutual and will be headlined by Chicago bluesman Toronzo Cannon, a hard rocking sometime bus driver who has gained world-wide fame with his charismatic live shows. Opening the evening will be Angel Forrest, winner of Maple Blues Award as Vocalist of the Year four times. She was a finalist at this year's International Blues Challenge and her distinctive voice and fiery personality have drawn comparisons to Janis Joplin. Sandwiched between is New Orleans keyboard player John Gros whose gumbo of Louisiana music includes elements of blues, Americana, funk and Mardi Gras Indian.

Saturday's music kicks off in the Nelson and Flanagan Tent with local favorite Nate Gross at 11:30 A.M. Following in the tent are Hubby Jenkins, a founding member of the Carolina Chocolate Drops, and the Prestage Brothers. Ben put on a great show as a solo act a few years ago and will return with his brother for an encore. Next up is A. J. Ghent – a very talented slide guitarist whose roots lie in the sacred steel tradition. Samantha Fish will close down the tent, and the festival, with what is sure to be an event highlight. Her award as Female Artist of the Year is well deserved as she has become the next star in the blues world.

The Sheffield Bio Science Infield Stage has a diverse and exciting group performing on it, led by Hall of Fame member, Elvin Bishop and his Big Fun Trio. From his early days with the Paul Butterfield Blues Band through a solo career that has featured chart topping hits like "Fooled Around and Fell in Love", Bishop has a fifty year career at the forefront of American music. Preceding him will be the Cash Box Kings, whose raucous live shows crackle with boundless energy. They play tough, real deal Chicago blues with contemporary authority and old school authenticity. Also on the Infield Stage is the Keeshea Pratt Band, a Houston based seven piece band that was the hands down winner at this year's International Blues Challenge. Check out her divine talents and see why she wowed the judges in Memphis. Opening things up will be returning festival favorite, Brandon Santini.

The Preferred Mutual Chenango Blues Fest is an all-volunteer run non-profit that prides itself on being "by fans, for fans." There are free childrens' activities on Saturday, and there is weekend long on-site camping for an extra fee. Friday's show is free for all, and those 17 and under can attend Saturday's show free as well if accompanied by an adult. Those 18 and over are \$25 in advance and \$35 the day of the show. There are great food and craft vendors on site. For full details on artists, grounds rules and ticket outlets please visit the website at www.chenangoblues-
