Player pianos were normal pianos except for an internal mechanism, which would cause the piano to play using paper rolls. The piano rolls had punched holes, which released air, thus playing the note. A 5-note chord, for example, would have 5 holes in the paper. The first models had foot pumps to establish the air pressure, later they were motorized. Gershwin used a player piano to teach himself to play. He slow pumped the pedals and placed his fingers over the keys, as they were depressed. Gershwin's keyboard skills led him to make piano rolls for pay, as it was a lucrative and huge industry. For the Gershwin piano roll transcriptions, which Nancy Hull is playing, the original rolls were played by a rare 1911 Pianola, which was a special machine with velvet mechanical fingers. This Pianola played the notes from the piano rolls on a Disklavier, which then was able to transcribe what it played. Thus you are hearing what Gershwin himself played many decades ago. arrangement for 2 pianos "Sweet and Low Down" was taken from a process called overdubbing in which the pianist played repeatedly on the same roll so that a full, busy, exhilarating sound resulted. Chip is playing a jazz piano and improvising the parts as Gershwin would have done.
