Kirk Severtson has been on the faculty since 2001, coaching singers and pianists in opera and art song and teaching classes in art song and accompanying. During the summer, he coaches for Lake George Opera (NY) and has previously coached at Opera North (NH), the Opera Theater of Lucca (Italy), the Cincinnati Opera outreach program, the Rising Star Singers festival, and Dorian Opera Theater, and held a fellowship at the Aspen Music Festival in vocal chamber music. He holds a B.A. from Luther College with majors in music, math, and computer science, and M.M. and D.M.A. degrees in piano performance from the University of

Cincinnati, College-Conservatory of Music. He appears frequently in recital with both singers and instrumentalists. Synopsis

Before the opera begins . . .

Egisto and Clori are in love. Venere has cursed Egisto for scorning her. Egisto and Clori are captured by pirates and taken to separate islands. During their captivity, Clori falls in love with Lidio who was similarly taken from Climene on their wedding day. They return to Zakynthos and move on with their lives. After a year in captivity, Egisto and Climene escape and make their way home to find their loved ones. To complicate matters, Climene's brother Ipparco desires Clori who does not return his affections.

PROLOGUE

Night is defeated by Dawn and a new day begins.

ACT I

Tired from their long journey, Egisto and Climene are sleeping in a wooded area, unaware that Clori and Lidio are nearby. Despite fond memories of Egisto, Clori has affirmed her new love for Lidio by carving their names on the trees. Egisto tells Climene about his love for Clori. However, after seeing the carvings, they vow revenge. Ipparco is anxious for news about Clori from Dema who reflects on the perils of youthful love.

Bellezza and Volupia argue whether beauty or sensuality is more likely to entice love. Amor comments on love's frivolity and the three poke fun at the mortals. Venere suggests to her son Amor that she will never be happy if Egisto Clori reunite. Amor vows to revenge his mother's humiliation by keeping the lovers apart.

Climene finds Lidio, but he tells her that he now loves Clori. Climene is distraught and tells her brother Ipparco who vows to kill Lidio. Dema thinks that Ipparco is foolish. Clori tries to deny her feelings for Egisto. She storms off leaving Egisto to cry out in agony.

-15 minute intermission-

$\operatorname{ACT} \mathrm{II}$

The Heroines Who Died for Love confront Amor for destroying Egisto and Clori's love. Apollo teases Amor and tells him that he will intercede if Amor promises to reunite the mortal lovers. Amor agrees, but Apollo and the Heroines are not convinced.

Clori and Lidio vow to remain faithful to each other and are discovered by Climene and Ipparco. Ipparco takes Clori from Lidio and encourages Climene to kill Lidio. Amor reverses the spell on Climene and Lidio, but is unwilling to help Egisto who is crazed with confusion and grief. To spite Amor and preserve the love of the mortal couple, Semele restores Egisto's sanity and Clori is overcome by compassion for him. There is general rejoicing as daytime comes to an end. Egisto and Clori are reunited and the cycle is complete.

Notes on the Opera and Production

Francesco Cavalli's *L'Egisto* was one of the most successful operas in mid-17th century Italy from its debut in 1643 at the Teatreo San Cassiano in Venice. It is a favola dramatica musicale (a dramatic story set to music) in a prologue and three acts and involves two intersecting love triangles interspersed with comic scenes. The artificial plot is contrasted by the music that beautifully reflects the extremes of emotion with poignant clarity.

The opera is propelled through the use of exquisitely crafted dramatic recitatives, arias and duets. We expanded the group of Heroines Who Died for Love to allow for musical and dramatic variety. For this production, the piece is separated into two acts using only one intermission. The wind band is placed onstage to enhance the musical interaction between the singers and instrumentalists. We found that inserting brief pauses after some scenes allows for time to adjust both dramatically and technically.

This is the first time we are using supertitles for our performances. Carleen Graham and Kait Van Heusen created the version you will see based on a literal translation by Kirk Severtson.

Artistic Personnel

This is Julia Ferreri's second year as the costume shop manager for SUNY Potsdam, and her third Crane Opera Ensemble production. Julia received her MFA in costume technology from Ohio University. Last summer she worked for the Heritage theatre festival in Charlottesville Virginia as a draper and will travel to Cooperstown, NY to work as the floor manager for Glimmerglass Opera this summer. She has also worked at Utah Shakespeare festival, Alabama Shakespeare festival, Pennsylvania Shakespeare festival, and the Berkshire Theatre Festival. She sends her



love to her husband Stephen and their two 'children', Spike and Katie.



Carleen Graham is Professor of Opera and has directed The Crane Opera Ensemble since 1991. She is the recipient of the 2009 SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching; the 2006 SUNY Potsdam President's Award for Excellence in Teaching; and the 2007 College Foundation Board Fundraising Volunteer of the Year. Carleen regularly directs for the Curso Internacional de Música Vocal in Aveiro, Portugal. Recent publications include articles for OPERA America *Perspectives Series* and *Educationlink*, as well as *The Journal of Singing* (2009). She is currently a candidate

for the Ed.D. at Teachers College, Columbia University and will return Glasgow this spring to stage direct for the Royal Scottish Academy of Music & Drama opera theatre department.
